

Why Are So Many Research Applications Rejected?

Applying for a PhD or MPhil is very different from applying for a taught master's degree. This podcast explains why research applications are often rejected and how WorldStudentAdvisors can help applicants take a more targeted and informed approach.

The Key Difference

For a taught master's application, the university normally assesses your academic qualifications, English language level, personal statement, references and other required documents. If you meet the entry requirements, you may receive an offer.

A research degree application will often require these documents but may also require something crucial: a research proposal.

A research proposal provides an overview of the research you intend to undertake. It identifies the subject area, the questions you want to investigate and how your proposed research relates to existing knowledge.

Why Research Applications Are Rejected

A strong academic background and a good research proposal are not enough on their own. A university will normally need to be satisfied about three important areas:

1. Is the research proposal of the required academic standard?
2. Is the university research active in the applicant's proposed area?
3. Are suitable academics interested and available to supervise the research?

If any one of these elements is missing, the application may be unsuccessful.

This means an excellent proposal can still be rejected if it is submitted to the wrong university or if an appropriate supervisory team is unavailable.

A Common Mistake

Some research applicants develop a proposal based on their master's dissertation and then submit broadly to numerous universities without first investigating their research strengths or potential supervisors.

This can result in delays or rejection.

A more effective approach is to identify universities where your proposed research fits established academic expertise and where suitable supervision may be available.
